AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS; CHAPTER 44 TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES, SECTION 44-29 AND SECTION 44-87 NO PARKING ANYTIME RELATED TO 21st STREET CHOCTAW TO SHAWNEE STREET. PROVIDING SUBSTITUTE PROVISIONS AND REPEALING THE SECTION AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1. That the Code of Ordinance of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, Chapter 44 Traffic and Vehicles, Section 44-29 One-way streets, is hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44-29. One-way streets.

Vehicular traffic shall proceed in the direction indicated on the following streets:

- 1) 3rd Avenue, from the south side of Spruce Street to the north side of Middle Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed south.
- 2) 4th Avenue, from Middle Street to Spruce Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed north.
- 3) 6th Avenue, from Marshall Street to Ohio Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed south.
- 4) 7th Street, from Spruce Street to Olive Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed north.
- 5) 21st Street, from Choctaw to Shawnee Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed north.
- 6) Chestnut Street, from 4th Street to 5th Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed west.
- 7) Delaware Street, from 6th Street to North Esplanade, vehicular traffic shall proceed east.
- 8) Evergreen Street, from Maple Avenue to Second Avenue, vehicular traffic shall proceed east.
- 9) Johnson Street, south of Lawson School, between 4th Street and 5th Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed east.
- 10) Klemp Street from Ohio to Kansas Street northbound.
- 11) Miami Street, from the west side of 5th Street to the east side of Broadway, vehicular traffic shall proceed west.
- 12) Muncie Road, from Lakeview to Hughes Road, vehicular traffic shall proceed east.
- 13) Osage Street, from the west side of 5th Street to the east side of Broadway, vehicular traffic shall proceed east.
- 14) South Esplanade, from Olive Street to Elm Street, vehicular traffic shall proceed south.

Section 2. That the Code of Ordinance of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, Chapter 44 Traffic and Vehicles, Section 44-87 No parking any time, is hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44-87. No parking any time.

The parking of automobiles, motor trucks, carriages, wagons and any and all other vehicles is prohibited on the following streets at any time:

- 1) Second Avenue, west side, lying east of block E, Fackler's Addition to the city, from the north side of Linn Street to the south side of Elm Street.
- 2) Second Avenue (originally platted as Sixth Street), west side, from the intersection with Linn to the intersection with Elm.
- 3) Fourth Street, both sides, from the north side of Eisenhower Road to the south side of Metropolitan, with the exception that parking is allowed on the east side of Fourth Street from the north side of Walnut Street to the south side of Custer Street.
- 4) Fifth Avenue, east side, from a point 70 feet south of the south curbline of Marshall Street to a point 70 feet north of the north curbline of Marshall Street.
- 5) Fifth Avenue, east side, from the south side of Olive Street to the north side of Spruce Street.
- 6) Fifth Avenue, west side, from a point 70 feet north of the north curbline of Marshall Street to a point 97 feet south of the south curbline of Marshall Street.
- 7) Fifth Street, approximately eight feet adjacent to the entrance area at the dog and cat clinic located at 1101 North Fifth Street.
- 8) Sixth Avenue, west side, from James to Prospect.
- 9) Seventh Street, east side, from the south side of Walnut Street to the north side of Olive Street.
- 10) Seventh Street North, both sides, from the north side of Cheyenne Street to the south side of Metropolitan Avenue.
- 11) Seventh Street, west side, from the intersection of Spruce Street to the intersection of Olive.
- 12) Seventh Street West, west side, from the intersection of Seventh and Short to the intersection of West Seventh Street and Oak.
- 13) Seventh Street, from the north curbline to Marshall Street, to a point 30 feet north on West Seventh Street.
- 14) Tenth Avenue, east side, from Pennsylvania to Metropolitan Street.
- 15) Tenth Avenue, both sides, from Pennsylvania to Eisenhower Street.
- 16) Tenth Street, east side, from Pennsylvania to Metropolitan Street.

- 17) 14th Street, on either side, between New Lawrence Road and a point 150 feet south of Independence Court.
- 18) 14th Street, west side, from the south side of Metropolitan Street to the north side of Cheyenne Street.
- 19) 15th Street, south, west side, from the south side of Vilas Street to the north side of Limit Street.
- 20) 20th Street, both sides, from the north side of Spruce Street to the south side of Metropolitan.
- 21) 20th Street Trafficway, both sides, north of Eisenhower to its terminus.
- 22) 21st Street, west side from Choctaw Street to Shawnee Street.
- 23) Columbia, west side, from Charles Street for a distance of 77 feet.
- 24) Commercial Street, south side, from Fourth Street to Commercial Place.
- 25) Dakota Street, north side, from the intersection of 18th Street to the city limits.
- 26) Dakota Street, both sides, from the intersection of Cheyenne curve east to the railroad tracks.
- 27) Evergreen Street, from the west side of Fourth Street right-of-way line to the west line extended of lot 5, Thompson's Subdivision.
- 28) Frontage Street, from St. Mary's Street to Ash Street.
- 29) Limit Street, both sides, from Grand Avenue to Fourth Street.
- 30) Limit Street, both sides, from 14th to 15th Streets.
- 31) Limit Street, both sides, from 22nd Street to 16th Street.
- 32) Limit Street, south side, from 4th Street to Wilson Avenue.
- 33) Marion Street, both sides, from Fourth Street to Wilson Avenue.
- 34) New Lawrence Road, west side, from Wildwood to Gatewood.
- 35) Ohio Street, south side, from Grand Street to Klemp Street.
- 36) Oregon Street, from east of South Fourth Street.
- 37) Ottawa Street, south side, from 20th Street to 22nd Street.
- 38) Ottawa Street, north side, from 20th Street to the entrance of the parking lot at Sports Field.
- Pennsylvania Street, north side, from the west side of Fifth Avenue to the east side of Broadway.
- 40) Seneca Street, south side, from Broadway and Third Street, except where authorized by posted signs.
- 41) Seneca Street, on the south side of Seneca Street between Second Street and Third Street.

- 42) Shawnee Street, south side, from Broadway west to 10th Street.
- 43) Shrine Park Road, both sides, from the north side of Eisenhower Road to the south side of Limit Street.
- 44) Spruce Street, both sides, from the west side of 15th Street to the city limits.
- 45) Spruce Street, both sides, from the west side of Third Street to the east side of Fourth Street.
- 46) Spruce Street, south side, from the west side of Fourth Street to the east side of 15th Street, with the exception that no parking shall be allowed from the east corner of lot 29, block 35, Central Subdivision, to the east side of Newman Street.
- 47) State Street and Evergreen Street, both sides, from the west side of the Fourth Street right-of-way line to Evergreen Street and western Evergreen Street to the west line of lot 5, Thompson's Subdivision.
- 48) Terrace Road, east side, between High Street and Sherman Avenue.
- 49) Vilas Street, both sides, from 22nd Street to 16th Street.
- 50) Wilson Avenue, on both sides of the street from St. Mary's Street to a point 100 feet north.

Section 3. REPEAL. Chapter 44 Traffic and Vehicles, Section 44-29 One-way streets and Section 44-87 No parking any time, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, in existence as of and prior to the adoption of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Section 4: EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication in the official city newspaper.

POLICY REPORT 20-02 Recommendation for Revisions to the Personnel Policy Manual May 26, 2020

ISSUE:

Review and approve policy revisions to the City Personnel Policies & Procedures Manual, submitted by the Human Resources Director.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends approval of the proposed revisions to Section XI that would be effective immediately.

BACKGROUND:

Periodically changes to The City of Leavenworth Personnel Manual are recommended. These changes can originate in any number of ways. The revisions listed below have originated from submission from Staff to update the policy to be more comparable with the holiday schedule for other surrounding Kansas municipalities.

The primary factor under review was the addition of the day after Thanksgiving as a recognized holiday. This item has been discussed over several months and surveys were sent out to surrounding Kansas municipalities to compare holiday schedules and offerings. Some of the surrounding cities responding to the survey included: Atchison, Shawnee, Olathe, Overland Park, Topeka, Derby, Ft. Scott, Liberal and Leavenworth County.

The survey identified 9 surrounding municipalities that all recognize the day after Thanksgiving as a City holiday; 7 of the cities provide 11 holidays and 2 of them provide 12 paid holidays for employees. There were a handful of additional surrounding counties that also responded, most of which provided 10 paid holidays, all of which included the day after Thanksgiving as a holiday.

The City Manager Holiday that is currently provided to employees, identifies one of three days that may be used for this holiday. After reviewing the survey results, the majority of all responding cities and counties allow for a similar "personal day" but there are no restrictions on which day it can be used, other than to limit it to the current calendar year. This provides the flexibility for employees to have a choice and also allows the departments to not have potential staffing issues on one or two days of the year to ensure everyone has the opportunity to use their holiday.

REVISIONS TO CURRENT POLICY:

SECTION XI – ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

XI-3. <u>HOLIDAY LEAVE</u> - No changes to Section B

A. The following days shall be holidays for all City employees:

New Year's Day Martin Luther King's Birthday President's Day Memorial Day Independence Day Labor Day Veteran's Day Thanksgiving Day Day After Thanksgiving Christmas Day City Manager's Holiday*

*The City Manager's Holiday can be used on any one work day the employee selects and must be used before the last day of the pay period for each calendar year. Must be preapproved by supervisor and taken for employee's entire shift, cannot be taken in increments. This holiday will not be eligible for carryover into the following year or be paid out if unused.

Normally, if a holiday falls on a Saturday, it shall be observed on the preceding Friday. If it falls on a Sunday, it shall be observed on the following Monday.

ISSUE:

USD 453 is requesting that the City of Leavenworth waive permit fees for the upcoming Richard Warren Educational Campus and Leavenworth High School renovation projects.

BACKGROUND:

USD 453 is planning renovation projects for Richard Warren Educational Campus and Leavenworth High School. The valuation of construction for the Richard Warren Educational Campus project is estimated at \$2,800,000. The valuation of construction for the Leavenworth High School project is estimated at \$2,500,000. The projects will begin in 2020.

They have requested that the permit fees be waived for this project. The building permit fees would total \$15,574, and the estimated fees for the electrical, mechanical and plumbing permits would not exceed an additional \$1,500. Staff performed the plan reviews for these projects, so there are no plan review fees required for these projects.

City policy is that any waiver of permit fees must be approved by the City Commission. Building permit fees for various organizations have been waived in the past. These projects were generally associated with local government, education, and non-profit organizations.

The attached memorandum dated May 19, 2020, from Hal Burdette, Chief Building Inspector, provides a list of projects that the permit fees have been waived since 2010.

It will still be necessary that the permits be obtained and all other inspection requirements be met if the fees are waived.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Commission waive building permit fees associated with the Richard Warren Educational Campus and the Leavenworth High School renovation projects.

The Leavenworth Public School District will be renovating Warren Middle School at 3501 New Lawrence Rd. this summer. In this remodel we will be touching the kitchen, the classrooms pods, special education suite and adding a secured entrance. Additionally, we will be replacing exterior doors and windows, upgrading fire alarm, intercom and clocks, as well as upgrading parking lot lights and performing asphalt work in both parking lots. This work is estimated to cost \$2.8 million.

This summer we will also be constructing a secured entry for LHS 2012 10th Ave. and performing South parking lot grading and new parking surface and a mill and overlay on the North side of LHS. This work is estimated at \$2.5 million.

The City has been generous in the past in waiving our onsite inspection fees related to large construction projects and we would again ask for the exemption for all of the fees for this construction cycle generated from your Inspection office.

A request has been made to waive the permit fees for the renovation projects at the Richard Warren Educational Campus and Leavenworth High School by USD 453. The estimated project value for the Richard Warren Educational Campus is \$2,800,000, and the estimated project value for Leavenworth High School is \$2,500,000. These values were provided by USD 453 staff. I spoke with the general contractor to determine what portion of these values are related to code related construction and permitting. The revised project values for permitting purposes are \$1,958,005 for the Richard Warren Educational Campus, which involves two building permits, and \$429,757 for Leavenworth High School.

The building permit fees for the Richard Warren Educational Campus projects would be \$12,237, and the building permit fee for Leavenworth High School would be \$3,337, for a total for building permits fees of \$15,574.

I estimate that the electrical, mechanical and plumbing permit fees for these projects will not exceed \$1,500.

I have updated and attached a list of building permit fees that have been waived in recent years.

ISSUE:

Consider approval of the proposed the 2020 Pavement Management Program (PMP).

BACKGROUND:

In 2016, staff contracted with Stantec to provide an independent objective pavement condition analysis of the City streets using digital evaluation techniques. The result of that effort was that Pavement Management Programs between 2016 and 2019 included a large Granite Seal Program that concentrated on stabilizing streets City-wide. There was also a mill and overlay program during those years concentrated on significant repairs to 20th Street from Spruce Street to Eisenhower Road.

During the budget process for 2020, the Commission increased funding for the PMP beginning in 2020 and for future years. The total design/construction/inspection budget for the 2020 program is approximately \$2,000,000 with a focus on more structural repairs. Affinis engineers were awarded the design of the 2020 PMP by the Commission on February 25, 2020.

Staff used the services of Stantec again in 2019 to re-evaluate the pavement condition of City streets. These ratings were used by staff and Affinis engineers as a guide for the 2020 Pavement Management Program. The goal was to identify the best streets for the mill and overlay re-surfacing operations. The long-range goal is to improve street conditions with an emphasis on bringing the City's overall street PCI (Pavement Condition Index) rating up to a range of 65 – 75 (fair to satisfactory).

The Commission reviewed the City-owned parking lots proposed for inclusion in this year's project at the February 11, 2020 meeting. The two lots below were identified to have designs for repair completed, and the lot at the NW Corner of 3rd and Delaware was identified for inclusion in this year's Pavement Management Program.

- o NW corner of 3rd Street and Delaware Street.
- o Lot east of Pullman (north side of Cherokee and west of 2nd Street)

In general, work to be completed in the 2020 program is estimated as shown below. It is worth noting that due to world events the price of asphalt is less than seen in recent years, and additional work has been identified to take advantage of this opportunity.

The proposed Pavement Management Program for 2020 was developed considering the following:

- Review of streets expected to be in a mill/overlay program within the next three years based on PCI ratings and staff knowledge.
- Identify streets included in the 2020 PMP.
- Arrange the identified streets and prepare plans in such a way that additional streets can be added as "Add Alternate Streets" to streets identified as "Base Bid Streets" should funds be available.
- Complete plans for improvements to the parking lot at the northwest corner of 3rd and Delaware.

RECOMMENDATION:


Staff recommends the Commission review the proposed 2020 Pavement Management Program. If the program is found to be acceptable, the project will proceed to having bids opened in June 2020.



DISCUSSION

Structures that are assessed to be in an unsafe and dangerous physical condition pose a threat to the public health, safety and welfare of the City. To address and abate these structures, the City Commission, through its powers under Chapter 10, Article XI (Dangerous Structures) of the Code of Ordinances, has requested that City staff annually develop an inventory of unsafe and dangerous structures for review and potential removal through demolition.

STRUCTURES FOR CONSIDERATION

Staff has compiled a list of dangerous structures, which have been evaluated by staff in accordance with State statute. The City Commission reviewed a list of 25 structures at the April 14, 2020 City Commission meeting and voted at that time to proceed with placing 23 of the structures as presented on a list for public hearing. After that time, the property owner for one of the structures, 1152 Randolph, applied for a permit to demolish the detached garage on their own and is actively in the demolition process, so that property has been removed from the list put forth for public hearing.

City staff has completed the necessary paperwork to set a resolution for the public hearing. All property owners have been notified that their properties have been identified as unsafe and dangerous, and given opportunity to contact staff to discuss options for resolution.

Policy Report Price Chopper development Industrial Revenue Bonds May 26, 2020

Issue:

City staff and Super Market Developers, Inc., entered into a predevelopment agreement on May 6 for the purpose of facilitating redevelopment of the current Price Chopper store at 2107 S. 4th St. Among other items, the agreement outlines financial incentives that will be pursed – contingent upon City Commission approval – to make the project financially feasible. The majority of the incentive request, which includes Tax Increment Financing and a Community Improvement District, will come before the Commission as the City and development team work through a project timeline and development agreement. However, the predevelopment agreement includes a request for Industrial Revenue Bonds (IRBs), which would allow Super Market Developers, Inc., to use the City's state and local sales tax exemption for labor and building materials. The IRB process must be in place before the developer can start purchasing materials.

Process:

Before the Commission is the resolution of intent, which pending adoption, is sufficient documentation for Super Market Developers, Inc., to begin using the sales tax exemption. However, the City Commission may elect at any time before the IRBs are issued to halt the process, which would require Super Market Developers, Inc., to repay all exempted sales tax.

City staff has contacted bond counsel, and should the Commission approve the non-binding resolution of intent, the City would ask bond counsel to being preparing IRB documents, including a full application with financial information.

Commission action:

The non-binding resolution of intent is before the Commission for a vote.

A RESOLUTION EXPRESSING THE INTENT OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS, TO ISSUE ITS FEDERALLY TAXABLE INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BONDS IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$12,000,000 TO BOTH FINANCE VARIOUS IMPROVEMENTS BENIFITTING SUPER MARKET DEVELOPERS, INC., AND PROMOTE, STIMULATE AND DEVELOP THE ECONOMIC WELFARE OF BOTH THE CITY AND THE STATE OF KANSAS.

WHEREAS, the City of Leavenworth, Leavenworth County, Kansas, (the "City") is authorized and empowered pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-1740 to 12-1749(d), inclusive, as amended, (the "Act") to both issue its industrial revenue bonds to finance all or part of the cost of purchasing, acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, improving, equipping, furnishing, repairing, enlarging or remodeling certain facilities including commercial facilities and enter into lease agreements with any person, firm or corporation for the use and acquisition of such facilities in order to promote, stimulate and develop the economic welfare and prosperity of both the City and the State of Kansas (the "State"); and

WHEREAS, Super Market Developers, Inc., a Missouri corporation registered and in good standing as a foreign corporation in the State, (the "Applicant") has requested that the City issue its federally taxable industrial revenue bonds in one or more separate series in the maximum principal amount of Twelve Million Dollars (\$12,000,000) (the "Bonds") to finance the cost of acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, improving, equipping, furnishing, repairing, and remodeling certain commercial facilities and improvements to benefit the Applicant's retail grocery store and pharmacy operating as Price Chopper located generally at 2107 S. 4th Street, Leavenworth, Kansas (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the City does hereby find and determine it to be advisable and in the best interest of the City and its inhabitants that such Bonds, as and in the maximum amount so requested be authorized and issued by the City to finance the Project; and WHEREAS, such Bonds if, as, and when issued by the City will be payable solely and only from the moneys and revenues received by the City from the fees charged and rentals received for the use of the Project and not from any other fund or source; and

WHEREAS, pending the issuance of the Bonds, the Company intends to initiate the construction, furnishing and equipping of the Project and finance, on an interim basis, such capital expenditures with its own funds which it, by its acknowledgment and acceptance hereof, intends to reimburse and permanently finance with the proceeds of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, this resolution is intended to constitute a non-binding declaration of the official intent of the City to issue such Bonds and it is not bound or otherwise obligated to the Applicant to issue the Bonds if in its sole discretion it determines for whatever reason not to issue such Bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, LEAVENWORTH COUNTY, KANSAS, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Governing Body of the City hereby finds and determines that the Project will promote, stimulate and develop the general economic welfare of the City and be in furtherance of the public purposes as set forth in the Act.

Section 2. That the Bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$12,000,000 be issued by the City in one or more separate series to finance the Project to be leased to the Applicant pursuant to and in accordance with the Act.

Section 3. That the terms of all ordinances, trust indentures, lease agreements and other documents required in the issuance of the Bonds (the "Bond Documents") shall be as agreed to by and between the City and the Applicant. The selection of the purchaser of the Bonds shall be the sole responsibility of the Applicant, subject to the approval of the City.

Section 4. That the City officials are hereby directed and authorized to proceed with the necessary negotiations relating to the Bond Documents with the Applicant and with the preparation of all other necessary documents relating thereto for final action by the Governing

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Body of the City. All terms and conditions of the Bonds and the sale thereof must be acceptable to and approved by the Governing Body of the City and the Applicant.

Section 5. That the City Clerk and Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, bond counsel, are hereby authorized and directed to prepare and cause to be filed and published, where necessary, all statements and notices required by the provisions of both K.S.A. 12-1740 et seq., as amended, and other applicable law.

Section 6. That although the Project site(s) and facilities may be entitled to an exemption from ad valorem taxation for a period of ten (10) years beginning after the calendar year in which the Bonds are issued in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 79-201a, as amended, the Applicant agrees that no such abatement of ad valorem taxes is contemplated or being requested by Applicant and, as such, no such abatement will be sought or otherwise requested. The City will, however, cooperate with and assist the Applicant in connection with the preparation and filing of any sales tax exemption certificate requests or refunds Applicant may lawfully request in connection with the Project.

Section 7. That the City will not be liable or otherwise responsible for the payment of any costs or expenses incurred by or in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

Section 8. That the issuance of the Bonds by the City shall, in addition to all other requirements of the City, be subject to any limitations imposed upon the City by either federal or Kansas law, including any regulations, rulings or executive orders which might appertain thereto.

Section 9. That this Resolution will be available for public inspection during regular business hours of the City at City Hall and shall be of force and effect from and after its adoption and approval.

Section 10. That this Resolution shall be of force and effect immediately upon its adoption and approval.

ISSUE:

Consider approval of Change Order No. 1 to the Linaweaver construction contract for the 2019 Sanitary Sewer I & I Project.

BACKGROUND:

On October 8, 2019, the City Commission approved the low bid of Linaweaver Construction for the project. Construction started on November 12, 2019 and continued through the winter and spring as weather would permit.

Work in the project included the replacement of a manhole and associated broken sewer pipe at 2400 Kingman and the replacement of the sewer line in the east/west alley between Kiowa & Dakota from 5th Street to Broadway.

The work at 2400 Kingman expanded due to additional sewer pipe deterioration after the plans had been completed. This situation increased the pipe replacement, backfill, and street restoration quantities for the site. (Item No.1)

To help with the maintenance of the sewer lines, staff tries to limit the distance between manholes to no more than 350 feet. MH A1 is a new manhole and installed with the project to facilitate that goal.

Work on the sanitary sewer line in the alley was deeper than the construction drawings identified. The starter manhole (MH 0095) for this line was an early 1900s flush tank (see attached drawing) that was not identified as a flush tank in our GIS system or by the survey. The way flush tanks are constructed, it places the sewer line deeper than it would be with a normal manhole that is not known until the flush tank and associated piping are removed. This situation increased the depth of the sewer line and manholes from MH 0095.1 to MH A1. All quantities for excavation, extra depth manhole section, backfill material, and service lines increased due to the additional depth of the sewer main. (Item No. 2, 3, 4)





WHEREAS, the City pursuant to Resolution No. B-2191 of the City, adopted on March 27, 2018, authorized the replacement of certain stone elements and to otherwise repair, reconstruct and renovate the City's Riverfront Community Center building facility at a total estimated cost of \$1,500,000 (the "RFCC Stone Replacement Project") under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1736 et seq., as amended; and

WHEREAS, the City has, pursuant to Resolution No. B-2192 of the City adopted March 27, 2018, authorized the improvement of a portion of New Lawrence Road, from 20th Street Trafficway and continuing in a northeasterly direction a distance of 1,400 feet, by preparing, grading, constructing, and otherwise completing a new 31 foot wide, back of curb to back of curb, street with a road surface of 8" asphalt placed on 6" of AB-3 over geo-grid reinforcement material on compacted soil sub-grade together with storm drainage, concrete curb and gutter, entrances, and other necessary items at a maximum estimated cost of \$605,000 (the "New Lawrence Road Project") under the authority of K.S.A. 12-685 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the City heretofore duly authorized, issued and delivered its Temporary Notes, Series A2018, dated June 28, 2018, pursuant to Resolution No. B-2201 (the "Series A2018 Note Resolution") adopted June 12, 2018, in accordance with the requirements of Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City, K.S.A. 12-1736 et seq., and K.S.A. 12-685 et seq., all as amended, in the principal amount of Three Million Four Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$3,460,000) (the "Series A2018 Notes") in part to temporarily finance the cost of the RFCC Stone Replacement Project and the New Lawrence Road Project, a portion of which Series A2018 Notes maturing on December 1, 2020 in the principal amount of \$215,000; maturing on June 1, 2021, in the principal amount of \$220,000; maturing on December 1, 2020, in the principal amount of \$250,000, all in the aggregate principal amount of \$910,000, will be redeemed and paid on July 1, 2020, from legally available funds of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has, in accordance with the powers of home rule of all cities of the State of Kansas under Section 5 of Article 12 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, passed and approved, by the vote of not less than two-thirds of the members-elect of the governing body of the City, Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City, which charter ordinance was published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of the City with such charter ordinance taking effect, without protest, on the sixty-first (61st) day following the publication thereof; and

WHEREAS, Charter Ordinance No. 56 both exempted the City from the provisions of K.S.A. 13-1024a, which was applicable to the City but not uniformly applicable to all Kansas cities and therefor was, in accordance with the City's powers of home rule, subject to the City's authority to exempt itself from the whole or any part of said K.S.A. 13-1024a, and, in accordance with such power of home rule, provided substitute and additional provisions on the same subject as in both K.S.A. 13-1024a; and

WHEREAS, the City has, pursuant to Resolution No. B-2214 of the City adopted February 12, 2019, authorized the construction of certain general improvements in the total estimated amount of \$1,887,985 (the "2019 General Improvements") to be made in the City under the authority of Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has heretofore duly authorized, issued and delivered its \$7,430,000 Temporary Notes, Series A2019, dated June 27, 2019, (the "Series A2019 Notes") pursuant to Resolution No. B-2224 (the "Series A2019 Note Resolution") adopted June 11, 2019, in accordance with the requirements of K.S.A. 12-685 et seq. and Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City in part to temporarily finance the costs of the 2019 Improvements, a portion of which Series A2019 Notes maturing on December 1, 2020, in the principal amount of \$1,390,000 will be redeemed and paid on July 1, 2020, from proceeds of the Bonds authorized herein; and

WHEREAS, the Series A2019 Notes are subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity, in whole or in part, at anytime on or after June 1, 2020, at the option of the City, at the redemption price of 100% of the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon to the date of redemption; and

WHEREAS, the City has, pursuant to Ordinance No. 8124 of the City adopted March 10, 2020, authorized certain stormwater utility system improvements and all other things necessary and incidental thereto at an estimated maximum total cost of \$3,165,000 (the "Stormwater Utility System Project") under the authority of K.S.A. 12-631r, 12-631s, 13-1055a, and 13-1055b, all as amended (the 2019 General Improvements and the Stormwater Utility System Project are collectively referred to as the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, all legal requirements pertaining to the Improvements have been complied with and the total cost thereof, including bond issuance costs, is \$_____(the "Project Cost") to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$_____ with the balance of such Project Cost payable from bond premium; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with all of the foregoing, the City deems it necessary and advisable to issue and sell its General Obligation Refunding and Improvement Bonds, Series 2020-A, in the aggregate principal amount of _______ Dollars (\$______) for the purpose of providing funds to (1) currently refund the Refunded Bonds in the principal amount of \$4,190,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon, (2) permanently finance the costs of the City's 2019 General Improvements, including redeeming and paying a portion of the Series A2019 Notes in the principal amount of \$1,390,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon on July 1, 2020, (3) financing the construction of the Stormwater Utility System Project, and (4) paying the cost of issuing the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the City does hereby authorize the issuance and sale of the bonds to the best bidder.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, LEAVENWORTH COUNTY, KANSAS:

Section 1. That for the purpose of providing funds to (1) currently refund the Refunded Bonds in the principal amount of \$4,190,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon, (2) permanently finance the costs of the City's 2019 General Improvements, including redeeming and paying a portion of the Series A2019 Notes in the principal amount of \$1,390,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon on July 1, 2020, (3) financing the construction of the Stormwater Utility System Project, and (4) paying the cost of issuing the Bonds, there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued General Obligation Refunding and Improvement Bonds, Series 2020-A, of the City in the aggregate principal amount of Dollars (\$_____) (the "Bonds") as provided by Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City, K.S.A. 10-427 et seq., K.S.A. 12-631r, K.S.A. 12-631s, K.S.A. 13-1055a, K.S.A. 13-1055b, and Article 1 of Chapter 10, Kansas Statutes Annotated, all as amended. The Bonds shall be dated and bear interest, shall mature and be payable at such times, shall be in such form, shall be subject to redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof and shall be issued in the manner prescribed and subject to the provisions, covenants and agreements set forth in a resolution of the Governing Body of the City adopted the same date as the date of the passage and approval of this Ordinance (the "Resolution").

Section 2. That the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to prepare and execute the Bonds and when so executed, the Bonds shall be registered as required by law and the Governing Body shall annually make provisions for the payment of the principal of, redemption premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds as the same shall become due by levying a tax upon all the taxable property of the City.

Section 3. That the City shall, and the officers, agents and employees of the City are hereby authorized and directed to, take such action and execute such other documents, certificates and instruments as may be necessary or desirable to carry out and comply with the provisions of this Ordinance and to carry out, comply with and perform the duties of the City with respect to the Bonds and the Resolution all as necessary to carry out and give effect to the transaction contemplated hereby and thereby.

Section 4. That if any portion or provision of this Ordinance or the Bonds shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such portion or provisions shall not effect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance or the Bonds but this Ordinance and said Bonds shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision had not been contained herein.

Section 5. That the Bonds shall be issued and sold to the purchaser thereof in accordance with both their bid for the purchase thereof and the terms and conditions of this Ordinance.

Section 6. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication in the official City newspaper.
