City Commission Regular Meeting Commission Chambers Tuesday, March 22, 2022 6:00 p.m.

**CALL TO ORDER** - The Governing Body met for a regular meeting and the following commission members were present in the commission chambers: Mayor Camalla Leonhard, Mayor Pro-Tem Jermaine Wilson, Commissioners Nancy Bauder, Edd Hingula and Griff Martin.

**Staff members present**: City Manager Paul Kramer, Assistant City Manager Penny Holler, Chief Building Inspector Harold Burdette, Finance Director Roberta Beier, Planning and Community Development Director Julie Hurley, Police Chief Patrick Kitchens, Public Works Director Brian Faust, City Attorney David E. Waters and City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner.

Mayor Leonhard asked everyone to stand for the pledge of allegiance followed by silent meditation.

#### **PROCLAMATIONS:**

**Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day March 29, 2022 –** Mayor Leonhard read the proclamation. The proclamation was accepted by Lynn Rolf.

Mr. Rolf:

- Recognized several Vietnam Veterans in attendance
- Stated the veterans continue to serve all the veterans in our community
- Requested support for a new veterans facility in the area

**Leavenworth Spring Clean Up Day April 2, 2022 –** Mayor Leonhard read the proclamation. The proclamation was accepted by Melissa Bower.

Ms. Bower:

- Almost 1000 people have signed up for the event
- Kick off ceremony at 8:30 a.m. on April 2nd at Warren Middle School
- Additional services available that day include, bulk item drop off, recycling center and brush site will be open, Household Hazardous Waste trailer operated by the County, free paper shredding provided by Citizens Federal Savings Bank

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

#### **Consideration of Previous Meeting Minutes:**

Commissioner Bauder moved to accept the minutes from the March 08, 2022 regular meeting. Commissioner Martin seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### **Second Consideration Ordinance:**

**Second Consideration Ordinance 8183 Rescind Special Use Permit 539 Nipper Lane** – City Manager Paul Kramer reviewed the Ordinance. There have been no changes since first introduced at the March 8, 2022 meeting.

Mayor Leonhard called the roll and Ordinance 8183 was unanimously approved

**Public Comment**: (Public comment on non-agenda items or receipt of petitions- limited to 2-3 minutes) Louis Klemp 1816 Pine Ridge Dr.:

- Discussed museums and where they should be relocated to
- County valuation numbers
- Discussed the rise in gas prices
- Mentioned the State's share of property tax monies
- Discussed ARPA fund disbursements to local entities
- Requested the City be conservative over the next 2 years

#### **Public Hearing:**

#### **Public Hearing for Unsafe or Dangerous Structure 717 Spruce Street:**

#### **Open Public Hearing:**

Commissioner Wilson moved to open the public hearing. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### **Staff and Public Comments:**

Chief Building Inspector Harold Burdette reviewed the property:

- Structure was damage by fire on November 13, 2021
- City received insurance proceeds
- Building permit has been issued and some work has been done
- Staff recommends giving 90 days for owners to make further repairs

Gary Nelson, Attorney for the property owner:

- Mr. Lis is working on the electrical
- Quite a bit of clean-up has been done
- They are progressing

#### **Close Public Hearing:**

Commissioner Hingula moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Commissioner Bauder moved to approve Resolution B-2311 giving the owners 90 days to complete repairs. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### **General Items:**

Mayor's Appointment Solid Waste Citizens Task Force - Mayor Leonhard moved to appoint to the Solid Waste Citizens Task Force Sarah Weygand, Anne Slusher, Gerard Overbey, John Denney Jr., Jeffrey Howards, Christian Howell, and Bryce Miller. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Review Unsafe and Dangerous Structure 767 Charles Street – Planning and Community Development Director Julie Hurley reviewed the property at 767 Charles Street, it was placed on the demolition list by Resolution B-2292 by the City Commission and granted an extension on November 9, 2021 for the owner to complete needed repairs. At the January 11, 2022 City Commission meeting the City Commission granted another extension. The outstanding item on this property is cleaning up the right-of-way, which is currently on-going. The property owner has installed a new roof, removed old siding and will be installing new siding shortly. Staff recommends the property be removed from the demolition list.

Commissioner Martin moved to remove the listed property from the demolition list. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

**Street Closure Request – First City History Festival Special Event –** City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner presented for consideration closure of 6<sup>th</sup> Street, from the alley behind TenPenny to Choctaw Street on Saturday, April 30, 2022 from Noon to 3:00 p.m. for the First City History Festival outhouse races and other games for participants at the festival.

#### Ken LaMaster:

- Goal of the group is to bring together all the historian groups and to have a festival to commemorate the areas rich history and promote Leavenworth
- Provided an overview of the event's offerings including vendors and reenactments

Commission Bauder moved to approve the street closure request of closing 6<sup>th</sup> Street, from the alley behind TenPenny to Choctaw Street on Saturday, April 30, 2022 from Noon to 3:00 p.m. Commissioner Martin seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### **Bids, Contracts and Agreements:**

Rejection of Bids for Storm Drainage Improvements at 741 Pottawatomie – Public Works Director Brian Faust introduced the item as the area around 741 Pottawatomie experiences significant flooding during moderate and heavy rain events. The current system is not sufficient for the volume of water and as a result, water does pond in the side yards and can get fairly deep. The City hired Wilson & Company to design improvements at this location. The complete bids received were all over the Engineer's estimate. Staff feels that the bids should be rejected and if rejected, staff will redefine the scope and design and rebid the project.

#### Commissioner Hingula:

Asked why we have to reject the bids

#### Mr. Kramer:

Replied because the City solicited bids, the City has to officially reject them before it can be re-bid

Commission Wilson moved to reject all bids for the Storm Drainage Improvements at 741 Pottawatomie and direct staff to re-bid the project. Commissioner Hingula seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Consider Design Contract for the Traffic Signal Assessment – Public Works Director Brian Faust presented for consideration a contract with Olsson, Inc. for a complete assessment of traffic signals. This project is an important component of the City Commission "Roadways and Infrastructure" goal. KDOT recently completed a TEAP (Traffic Engineering Assistance Program) Study which identified a need for a complete evaluation of the City's traffic signal system. The City has 43 traffic signals in our system ranging from several decades old to brand new. It is critical to assess the signals to determine remaining life, replacement costs and the consequence of failure for components within our system along with planning for the future. The City requested proposals from qualified firms that were interested in helping the City complete the following:

- Non-structural data collection
- Structural assessment
- Prioritization and replacement plan and maintenance schedule
- Traffic signal standards and specifications

The three submittals were evaluated and the top 2 firms were interviewed. After the interview, Olsson was identified as the top firm. City staff worked with Olsson to negotiate a detailed project scope of serves along with an estimated engineering fee for the work.

#### Mr. Kramer:

 Reviewed the fiscal comments pertaining to utilizing Federal Funds Exchange dollars that the City has reserved for street projects

#### Commissioner Martin:

- Did you get any idea from KDOT on what funding could be available
- Expand on connectively between signalization and vehicles

#### Mr. Faust:

- KDOT advised that funding could be available, but it is not a guarantee
- It could be very important for that connectively to improve the efficiency of our signalization with talking with cars

Commission Bauder moved to approve the Traffic Signal Assessment contract with Olsson, Inc. for an amount not to exceed \$93,214.00. Commissioner Martin seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### **First Consideration Ordinance:**

**First Consideration Ordinance Rezoning 1830 South Broadway Street** – Planning and Community Development Director Julie Hurley presented for first consideration an ordinance rezoning 1830 South Broadway Street from R1-6, High Density Single Family Residential District to RMX, Residential Mixed Use District. The item was heard by the Planning Commission at their March 7, 2022 meeting and was voted 4-0 to approve the proposed change. Ms. Hurley reviewed the request:

- The property owner requested the rezone
- The property is 9.32 acres in size
- Current tenants in the building is the Council on Aging, who is anticipated to relocate in 2022

- Owner wants to renovate the building to residential and business/office space, 30 multi-family units
- Reviewed Golden Factors when reviewing Rezoning Requests:
  - Character of neighborhood
  - The zoning and use of properties nearby
  - o The suitability of the subject property for the uses to which it has been restricted
  - o The extent to which removal of the restrictions will detrimentally affect nearby property
  - o The length of time the subject property has remained vacant as zoned
  - The relative gain to economic development, public health, safety, and welfare by the reduction of the value of the landowners property as compared to the hardship imposed by such reduction upon the individual landowner
  - o The recommendations of permanent or professional staff
  - The conformance of the requested change to the adopted or recognized Comprehensive Land
     Use Plan being utilized by the city
  - o Such other factors as my be relevant to a particular proposed amendment

#### Commissioner Bauder:

Why wasn't corrected zoning done when the Council on Aging moved in

#### Ms. Hurley:

• The Council on Aging currently operates as a legal non-conforming use

#### Mr. Baljit Baidwan property owner of 1830 S. Broadway:

- As for number of units, don't have complete plan, but as an estimate could be 30 units
- Wants best use of the building

#### City Attorney Waters:

- Commissioners aren't approving a specific plan, you are deciding if the land use is the appropriate use for the area
- There are other steps if this moves forward and other reviews this process goes through
- Explained a quasi-judicial process
- Think about the Golden Factors when making this decision

#### Commissioner Martin:

Define mixed use zoning and what that entails

#### Ms. Hurley:

- It's a mix of uses, multi-family, office space, commercial/retail uses(appropriate for neighborhood setting) to serve different needs of the community and residents
- Specific uses are defined in the development regulations

#### Commissioner Hingula:

Have you had an open meeting with the neighbors

#### Mr. Baidwan:

Had a good discussion with the residents at the planning commission meeting

#### Kathy Price 1825 S. Broadway:

- Attended Planning Commission meting
- Doesn't quite understand the process of what the end result is, if the request is rejected or affirmed
- Concerned about condition of streets, where parking would be
- Concerns with Garland Street
- Sewer concerns
- Would like to see a specific plan
- Upkeep of the property

#### Commissioner Bauder:

• In order for anything to be done it would need to be rezoned, so the plan isn't part of the discussion

#### Commissioner Martin:

- Asked if the request could be modified to remove the office space/commercial part and just rezone for residential
- Would like to know more about what the neighbors feel about the rezone

#### Mr. Kramer:

- Rezoning is selected by the applicant
- The requested zoning designation is the best indicator of what uses would be in there

#### Ms. Hurley:

- Property is currently zoned R1-6 with a special use permit for a nursing home
- Allowed use today is either a nursing home or single family residential

#### City Attorney Waters:

- Application is to rezone to these types of uses as permitted by the zoning code
- Options tonight are to approve the Planning Commission's recommendation, overrule the Planning Commission's recommendation or send back to the Planning Commission with notes of things to rereview

#### Mayor Leonhard:

• In support of the rezone

#### Commissioner Wilson:

- Definitely doesn't want any more abandoned buildings, doesn't want to deter development
- In favor of rezone

#### Commissioner Hingula:

Discussed tax benefit if property is developed

#### Commissioner Bauder:

Addressed that the plan will still go through other processes and reviews

#### Commissioner Hingula:

Asked if other types of zoning options were reviewed

#### Ms. Hurley:

- The application was for RMX so no other types were reviewed by the Planning Commission
- The Planning Department worked with the applicant in helping review other potential zoning designations

#### Mr. Price at 1825 S. Broadway:

Asked for clarification on the current zoning

#### Ms. Hurley:

Current zoning allows either a nursing home or single family

There was a consensus by the Commission to place on first consideration.

First Consideration Ordinance Revising Standard Traffic Ordinance to Regulate and Allow Electric Scooters – Assistant City Manager Penny Holler presented for first consideration an ordinance to amend the Standard Traffic Ordinance to allow the use of electric-assisted scooters on City streets in response to the Bird Scooter pilot program. Ms. Holler reviewed the proposed amendments:

- Amendment to prohibit electric-assisted scooters on any public sidewalks, paths, or trails; requires electric-assisted scooter use to comply with all other City ordinances
- Defines electric-assisted scooter and shared electric-assisted scooter company
- Adds reference to the Standard Traffic Ordinance (STO)
- Adds prohibition against parking shared electric-assisted scooters on public property including sidewalks, streets, and parking lots in a manner that blocks pedestrian travel, public parking, or creates a traffic hazard
- Requires a written agreement to operate a shared electric-assisted scooter company
- Establishes penalties for offenses associated with electric-assisted scooters

There was a consensus by the Commission to place on first consideration.

#### **Consent Agenda:**

Commissioner Martin moved to approve claims for March 5, 2022, through March 18, 2022, in the amount of \$907,880.76; Net amount for Payroll #05 effective March 11, 2022 in the amount of \$347,264.49 (No Police and Fire Pension). Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

#### Other:

City Manager Paul Kramer:

- Solid Waste Task Force first meeting will be April 6<sup>th</sup>, they will meet twice a month for first 2 months and re-evaluate meeting schedule after that
- Pothole patching will begin, people can submit potholes online or by calling the Service Center
- KDOT conference call this week, the State will submit 1 project for a RAISE grant, and they have chosen to submit the Centennial Bridge project

#### Commission Hingula:

• Hoping we are done with snow, but if not, be careful

#### Commissioner Wilson:

• Mentioned the great job the organizers of the St. Patrick's Day Parade did and the parade had a really good turn-out

#### Commissioner Bauder:

• Was a bit emotional with the Vietnam Veterans in attendance and stated they are a special group

#### Adjournment:

Commissioner Hingula moved to adjourn the meeting. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved and the meeting was adjourned.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 8184**

AN ORDINANCE REGARDING THE OPERATION OF ELECTRIC-ASSISTED SCOOTERS WITHIN THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS, AMENDING SECTION 44-1 OF CHAPTER 44 (TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES) OF THE LEAVENWORTH CODE OF ORDINANCES, AND ADDING ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS THERETO.

## BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

**Section 1.** That Section 44-1 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances is hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

#### Sec. 44-1. - Standard traffic ordinance adopted; amendments.

- (a) Adoption. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the city that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 48th Edition (2021), prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified, or changed.
- (b) Marked copies on file. One copy of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 8184" with all sections and portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of Ordinance No. 8184, and filed with the city clerk, to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable business hours. The police department, municipal judge, and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of official copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked, as may be deemed expedient.
- (c) *Amendments*. The Standard Traffic Ordinance adopted in this section is adopted subject to the following local amendments:
  - (1) Section 114.5 (Unlawful Operation of a Work-Site Utility Vehicle) is hereby amended by adding a new subsection (e) thereto, as follows:
    - (e) As provided by subsection (a)(2), it shall be unlawful to operate a worksite utility vehicle except for public safety and city maintenance staff within the corporate limits of the city.
  - (2) Section 135.1 (Electric-Assisted Scooters, Traffic Law Application) is hereby amended by adding a new subsection (e) thereto, as follows:

- (e) As provided in subsection (c) above, it shall be unlawful to operate electric-assisted scooters on any public sidewalks, paths, or trails within the City. The operation of an electricassisted scooter shall at all times be in compliance with the provisions of Article VII of Chapter 44 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances.
- (d) *Omitting*. Section 69(d) of the Standard Traffic Ordinance relating to city permits for soliciting of contributions is hereby declared to be omitted and deleted.

**Section 2**. A new Article VII in Chapter 44 of the City of Leavenworth Code of Ordinances is hereby established to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE VII. SPECIAL RULES RELATED TO ELECTRIC-ASSISTED SCOOTERS

#### Sec. 44-230. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

*Digital network* shall mean any online enabled application, software, website or system offered or utilized by a shared electric-assisted scooter company that enables the use or operation or electric-assisted scooters.

Electric-assisted scooter shall mean every self-propelled vehicle that has at least two wheels in contact with the ground, an electric motor, handlebars, a brake and a deck that is designed to be stood upon when riding, as set forth in K.S.A. 8-1498, as amended.

Shared electric-assisted scooter shall mean electric-assisted scooters which are part of a fleet of such electric-assisted scooters that use a digital network to connect such shared electric-assisted scooters to riders and operators.

Shared electric-assisted scooter company shall mean a corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, person, or other entity operating in Kansas that uses a digital network to connect shared electric-assisted scooter riders or operators to shared electric-assisted scooters for transportation.

#### Sec. 44-231. Reference to Standard Traffic Ordinance.

The provisions of Section 135.1 of the Standard Traffic Ordinance, as adopted and modified by Section 44-1 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances, and regarding electric-assisted scooters, is incorporated herein by this reference.

#### Sec. 44-232. Prohibited Parking of Shared Electric-Assisted Scooters.

It is unlawful for any person to park or leave an electric-assisted scooter or shared electric-assisted scooter on public property, including but not limited to sidewalks, streets, roads, trails, paths, bicycle lanes, or parking lots where such shared electric-assisted scooter blocks pedestrian travel, public parking, or presents a traffic hazard. It is further unlawful to park or leave an electric-assisted

scooter or shared electric-assisted scooter against or attached to any public utility pole, traffic sign, or traffic signal.

#### Sec. 44-233. Operation of Shared Electric-Assisted Scooter Company.

It is unlawful for any shared electric-assisted scooter company, or person on behalf of the company, to deploy, maintain, or allow to be operated, any shared electric-assisted scooters owned or operated by the company, on any city streets, sidewalks, right-of-way, or city property within the city without a valid written agreement approved by the city.

#### Sec. 44-234. Penalties.

Violation of Sections 44-232 through 44-233, inclusive, shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense, with each day the violation continues constituting a separate offense. In addition to any penalties associated with violating this article, the shared electric-assisted scooter company, and/or any person violating this article, shall be assessed the costs associated with removal of the company's shared electric-assisted scooters from city streets, sidewalks, rights-of-way, or city property.

<u>Section 3</u>. Sections 44-220 through 44-229 of Chapter 44 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances are hereby designated as "Reserved".

<u>Section 4</u>. Section 44-1 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances, as previously adopted and in existence as of and prior to the adoption of this ordinance, is hereby repealed.

<u>Section 5</u>. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval, and publication in the official city newspaper.

## CONDUCT A PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDER AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF PLATTED RIGHT OF WAY LINE AT 1507 SHAWNEE STREET

#### ISSUE:

The issue before the City Commission is to place on first consideration an ordinance vacating a portion of Shawnee Street Right of Way (ROW) platted in Lot 1, Rafter's Replat of Block 61 of Central Subdivision, and a part of said Block 61 of Central Subdivision adjacent to 1507 Shawnee Street.

Prior to discussion of this vacation request, the Commission should open a Public Hearing to allow for all persons interested to appear and be heard. At the conclusion of the Public Hearing, a consensus is needed to place an ordinance on first consideration for approval of the request to vacate a portion of the Shawnee Street ROW.

#### BACKGROUND:

The property owners, Mr. & Mrs. Curtis Hammond, own property at 1507 Shawnee Street that was impacted by the realignment and reconstruction of Shawnee Street back in 2000. At that time, the city stated that it would support vacating some of the existing ROW west of their property (letter attached). The area requested has been maintained by the property owners.

City staff reviewed this proposal and location and offers the following observations:

- 1. There are no City improvements planned for this area that would require the City to retain ownership of this property.
- 2. Utility companies have indicated they have no issues with the proposed vacation.

Staff is always reluctant to recommend that the City relinquish ownership of public property without some public purpose being served. In this location, there are no utilities and no plans to revert back to a sharper curve in the roadway. Based on these factors, the Engineering Office supports this request.

The City has contractual agreements with the major utilities that allow them to use the ROW for their purposes. Notification has been sent to all of the local utility companies and their responses are attached.

#### POLICY:

The City Commission is required to hold a public hearing on proposed vacations. Staff generally supports vacation requests if they facilitate a greater public purpose. The City Engineer's Office supports the proposed vacation.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Commission will need a consensus to place an ordinance on first consideration for vacating a portion of Shawnee Street ROW platted in Lot 1, Rafter's Replat of Block 61 of Central Subdivision, and a portion of said Block 61 of Central Subdivision.

Dear Mr. & Mrs. Hammond:

John Amrien, The Land Company, asked that I prepare a letter addressing staff's offer concerning the acquisition of right-of-way and easements on your property. Staff is prepared to discuss the following offer of compensation with the Leavenworth City Commission. The City Commission will make the final decision.

The City's engineering staff is recommending the following items as compensation for the necessary right-of-way and easements.

1. The front yard, from the driveway west will be adjusted to approximately a 5:1 slope. Larkin Engineering has reviewed this request and agrees that this will work.

2. The driveway will be replaced to the same dimensions as it currently exists. All sidewalks will be reconnected. The southern line of driveway replacement will be approximately 4 feet from the garage. The driveway within the right-of-way will be limited to 20 feet in width. The 20-foot width is the maximum allowed by the Zoning Ordinance. The widening of the driveway to the current width will begin at the right-of-way.

3. The Shawnee Widening Project will not damage the two Holly bushes in front of the main house entrance. The bushes are outside of the temporary construction easement. It will be the contractor's responsibility to protect these bushes. In the event that they are damaged, it is the responsibility of the contractor to resolve any claims.

4. The two drainage lines extending to the right-of-way line will be connected to the storm sewer.

5. The three trees located in the front yard will be removed. One of the three trees is currently shown as "Leave In Place" (LIP) on the plans.

6. The front yard will be sodded with Zoysia. The current right-of-way area west of the current

property line will be sodded matching the existing grass material.

Staff will support vacating some of the existing right-of-way west of the your property line and south of the new Shawnee Street right-of-way. The City of Leavenworth cannot guarantee who will be the recipient of the vacated property as determined by Leavenworth County Assessor Office. Discussions with the Assessor's Office indicate your property lines would be extended to approximately the subdivision line.

8. Staff supports your request for \$1,500.00 for additional right-of-way and easements.

Staff will discuss these issues with the Leavenworth City Commission at the next possible meeting. Should these terms not be acceptable to you, please notify John Amrien. The staff is willing to discuss any or all of these issues if necessary.

- 3. The application shall be filled out completely by the applicant in order that the City Commission has a clear understanding of what the applicant desires. You must be the legal owner of the property (NOT LEASEE OR RENTER).
- 4. Procedure for filing and reviewing petitions shall be as follows:
  - a. Request a list of owners of adjacent property owners from the Leavenworth County GIS department.
    - a. Certified ownership shall include ADJACENT PROPERTY OWNERS ONLY, not a 200' radius.
  - Applications shall be filled out completely and filed in the Office of the City Clerk. If additional space is needed, attach additional sheets.
  - c. Applications MUST include a surveyors certified (stamped and signed) legal description of the area petitioned for vacation and include a depiction of the area.
  - d. All applications require the signatures of adjoining (adjacent) property owners even if the adjacent owners are the applicant.
  - e. A non-refundable fee of \$250 shall be paid at the City Clerk's Office at the time the application is filed.
  - f. Upon receipt of the properly executed application, LIST OF OWNERSHIP OF ADJACENT PROPERTY OWNERS and required filing fee, the City Clerk shall forward the application to the City Engineer and City Planner for review and recommendations.
  - g. After being reviewed by City Staff, the City Clerk shall publish a notice of this request and place this item on the agenda for the City Commission's consideration.











Figure 1 (Inc.)

# AN ORDINANCE VACATING PART OF THE RIGHT-OF-WAY ON A PORTION OF SHAWNEE STREET IN CENTRAL SUBDIVISION IN THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, LEAVENWORTH COUNTY, KANSAS.

**WHEREAS**, a petition for a vacation of part of the right-of-way on a portion of Shawnee Street in Central Subdivision in the City of Leavenworth, Leavenworth County, Kansas and fully described in Section 1 of this ordinance below has been submitted to the City of Leavenworth, Kansas; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas gave public notice of the same by publication in the official City newspaper on March 18, 2022 stating that a petition has been filed in the office of the City Clerk praying for such vacation, describing the property fully and setting April 12, 2022 as the hearing date on which the petition shall be presented to the Governing Body of the City for hearing and that at such time and place and giving instructions to all persons interested to be heard under the petition; and

**WHEREAS**, the petition did proceed to hearing as published and no objections were filed with the City Clerk or received at the time of the hearing; and

**WHEREAS**, all utility companies were notified and agreed to such vacation described in Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, all the requirements of K.S.A. 12-504 et. seq. have been complied with.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

**Section 1**. The right-of-way to be vacated are described as follows:



#### Discussion:

As an entitlement community, Leavenworth is required by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to submit an Annual Action Plan every year. A Consolidated Plan must be submitted every three or five years to outline community needs to be addressed with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. For the year 2022, Leavenworth will be submitting a Five Year Consolidated Plan. The Five Year Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan are formulated using an electronic planning tool provided by HUD. The report is composed of needs assessments of community's housing stock, homelessness issues, public facilities, infrastructure, and community development assets.

The award figures are projected, at this time. The award for 2022-23 is yet to be established, as congress has not voted upon the funds. Once award has been given the projected award will be updated to the true award total. The Community Development Advisory Board (CDAB) has voted for a pro-rata configuration once the true award total is given.

CDAB held two open public meetings to solicit community input on February 14, 2022 and March 14, 2022. All public comments were accepted and received. The Community Development Coordinator had a survey conducted utilizing Survey Monkey to reach out to the citizens of Leavenworth for an opportunity to weigh in on public needs. Those results were utilized and considered into this Consolidated Plan. The award is yet to be established, as congress has not voted upon the funds. Once the award has been given the projected award will be updated to the true award total.

The needs in the community will continue to be monitored with the statistics received from our public service agencies, requests for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program funds for low to moderate income and the staff in Community Development. The Consolidated Plan will be recommended to be amended if there shall be changes in the community's needs that CDBG funds can resolve.

#### **ISSUE:**

Consider approving the MOU with Bird Scooters to start a shared electric scooter pilot project.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Bird Scooters proposed a 12-month pilot project that would deploy 75 electric scooters in Leavenworth. The Memorandum of Agreement (MOU) outlines the rules that Bird Scooters will follow during that pilot project to encourage safe traveling practices and ensure public safety. The experience of other cities that approved a pilot project was also shared during the March 15 Commission Study Session. Specific terms were included in the MOU to address issues experienced in other cities including communication on proper scooter use and minimum rider age. Should the MOU be approved, the pilot project would begin after the publishing of the ordinance amendment allowing electric scooters on City streets.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

**THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING** (this "<u>Agreement</u>") is made effective as of the last date of signature below (the "<u>Effective Date</u>") by and between the **City of Leavenworth, Kansas** (the "<u>City</u>") and **Bird Rides, Inc.** ("<u>Bird</u>"), so as to permit Bird to provide services under the following terms and limitations. This Agreement shall remain in effect until and through April 12, 2023 unless terminated as set forth below.

#### **AGREEMENT**

- 1) Scope: This Agreement and its terms apply to any proposed deployment of stand-up electric scooter sharing systems that meet the definition of an "electric-assisted scooter" as set forth in K.S.A. 8-1498 (collectively, "Scooters") within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City, but excluding any private property not owned by the City, which may retain their own rules or policies regarding the use of Scooters, to the extent provided by applicable law. Bird shall not deploy Scooters in the City and, to the extent of Bird's requirements as described in this Agreement, allow persons to use Scooters in the City in violation of this Agreement.
- Scooters and the use thereof shall be governed by and operated in accordance with such statutes, rules, and regulations as may exist under the laws of the State of Kansas applicable thereto, including but not limited to K.S.A. 8-15,113, Chapter 44 of the Leavenworth Code of Ordinances (as may be amended), and in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. By way of example only, the City and Bird understand that, as of the Effective Date, the rules applying to bicycles apply to Scooters such that Scooters are to be ridden on streets, and where available, in bike lanes and bike paths. Scooters are to stay to the right of street lanes and to offer the right of way to bicycles in bike lanes and on bike paths. Users of Scooters shall be 18 or older, and have a valid drivers license. Additional terms are set forth on Exhibit A which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. Users of Scooters who violate these provisions may be fined by the City consistent with applicable law. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to interpret, waive, or amend any Kansas requirements regarding the use of Scooters.
- 3) Bird shall provide easily visible contact information, including toll-free phone number and/or e-mail address on each Scooter for members of the public to make relocation requests or to report other issues with devices.
- 4) Hours of operation: Scooters will be made available to rent from 4 am to midnight pm (local time).
- 5) Bird shall provide a minimum of 50 Scooters at launch.
- 6) <u>Safety Education</u>: Bird will provide materials, videos, signage to promote safe riding and educate riders on rider responsibilities and encourage safe and courteous riding and parking.
- 7) <u>Data sharing</u>: Bird will provide data to the City as necessary to assist with monitoring program usage.
- 8) <u>Indemnification</u>: Bird agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its affiliates, agents, employees, and governing body members from and against all actions, damages or claims brought against City arising out of Bird's negligence or willful misconduct or Bird's breach of this Agreement, except that Bird's indemnification obligation shall not extend to claims of City's employees', agents' or affiliates' negligence or willful misconduct. To the extent permitted by law, the City expressly acknowledges that in no event shall Bird be liable for any special, indirect, consequential or punitive damages. Bird shall have sole control of any defense; the City shall not consent to the entry of a judgment or enter into any settlement without the prior written consent of Bird.
- 9) <u>Insurance</u>: Bird shall provide the City with proof of insurance coverage exclusively for the operation of Scooters including: (a) Commercial General Liability insurance coverage with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence and \$2,000,000.00 aggregate; (b) Automobile Insurance coverage with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence and \$1,000,000.00 aggregate; and (c) where Bird employs persons within the City, Workers' Compensation coverage of no less than the statutory requirement.

10) <u>Notices</u>: All notices and communications to the City from Bird shall be made in writing (includes electronic communications) and sent to the address below.







#### Issue:

Consider approval of a contract for Sanitary/Storm Sewer Rehabilitation in the amount of \$164,108.75.

#### Background:

The City of Leavenworth started using CIPP lining in the 90s. The CIPP is a cured-in-place liner for pipes and to rehabilitate sewers. This rehabilitation project will improve the structural integrity of these lines. These lines can be installed quickly and with little or no disruption, e.g. streets not closed as long and sanitary services opened quicker. This means no excavating which normally takes days and in some cases weeks to finish whereas CIPP lining can be finished in a day.

The City CCTV crew has been working to identify lines that are broken and are good candidates for CIPP lining.

We are using a Cooperative Agreement with Insituform and their contract with Johnson County Kansas Wastewater.

Staff is recommending that five (5) sanitary lines and two (2) storm sewers be lined this year:

#### **Budget Impact:**

Staff looked at the cost for design and construction (with open excavation) at these locations. Cost estimate for open cutting is approximately \$575,000.

#### **Staff Recommendation:**

Staff recommends the City Commission approve a contract with Insituform for the 2022 Sanitary/Storm Sewer Rehabilitation project for \$164,108.75.




